Letting the Spirit Lead

Steve Jobs, founder of Apple Computers, once said this: "The people who are crazy enough to think they can change the world are the ones who do."

I don't know if he knew about the first followers of Jesus, the ones who walked with him for three years, who were so human that they even sometimes frustrated Jesus in their slowness to comprehend him (see Mark 8:14-18). I don't know if Steve Jobs ever read the Gospels, which give us the back-story of how the church came into being.

The church itself has a pretty mixed history in this world. The church is flawed because it's made up of people. And people (including us) have a tendency to mess up from time to time, and a tendency to long for rest, retirement, ease and comfort, and gradually disengage from the race (the one that the Apostle Paul ran so as to get the prize in 2 Timothy 4:7). Some are only drawn to power. Some are forced into hereditary roles in the church. Some take part out of pride or obligation, doing so without the most important element at work in their life. It's that element that makes the church the church. It's the glue that holds us together. We all need the Spirit.

The Holy Spirit leads us and guides us and gives us vision. But the price of having the Holy Spirit is high: it means surrender to the person of Jesus Christ. It can mean going to places you would rather not go (John 21:18). It can mean being open to a newness of purpose just when you are getting ready to put up your feet for the duration.

The Apostles Peter and Paul were blown by the wind of the Spirit until the day each died in captivity. We know more about Paul's itinerary than Peter's; but we do know that Peter ended up in Rome – the center of the Empire. Paul must have been the most sought-after customer for cobblers for all the miles he put on his sandals. The Apostle John also opened himself to God's work well into his later years, having written at least Revelation and his three letters in the final quarter of the first century. All three of these early, highly influential leaders, were faithful to the end. And they helped change the world in obedience to their callings in Jesus Christ.

This is our calling also. We do this by following the Spirit's lead. We can follow his lead no matter what. We can follow his lead no matter the outcome of Tuesday's election. We can follow his lead despite the unknowns. We can follow his lead without knowing what the Fed will do at their next meeting. We can follow his lead no matter what other countries decide to do on the world stage.

Happy month-of-Thanksgiving! In this newsletter, I'd like to take a few minutes to reflect on our gratitude for veterans, which we'll express with the singing of a hymn that isn't in the newly retired blue hymnal, but is in *Glory to God*. It will not, however, be new to most of the congregation. That hymn is "Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory," which you may know as "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Julia Ward Howe wrote this text in 1861 at the outset of the Civil War after observing Union troops on review near Falls Church, Virginia. Delayed by the heavy traffic of sharing the road back to DC with said troops, the party passed the time by singing "army-related" songs, including "John Brown's Body," which was sung to a well-known camp-meeting tune and memorializes deceased abolitionist, John Brown (and may also have been intended as a humorous reference to a still-living sergeant of the same name). A fellow traveler suggested that Mrs. Howe should write more pleasant words for such an enjoyable tune. It's not clear exactly who made this suggestion or if this person was aware of the sacred origins of the tune. In any event, the original camp-meeting song, "Say, Brothers, Will You Meet Us," invites the listener to meet the singer on Canaan's happy shore, a symbolic reference to heaven. So the numerous scriptural allusions in the present text to the Second Coming of Christ could be seen as a return to the tune's original theme of eternal life with Jesus.

This year the Sunday closest to Veterans' Day will be **November 9**, when the epistle reading from the lectionary will be from 2 Thessalonians 2. Providentially, in our lectionary-assigned passage, Paul writes to the Thessalonians about Jesus' return ... and we're in the midst of a sermon series on the epistle readings from the lectionary, making "Battle Hymn" a most appropriate closing hymn for that day. I hope to see you in worship on November 9. And, please, remember to express thanksgiving—both *to* God *for* our veterans and to those who have served.

1 Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord; he is trampling out the vintage where the grapes of wrath are stored; he has loosed the fateful lightning of his terrible swift sword.

God's truth is marching on.

Refrain:

Glory, glory hallelujah! Glory, glory hallelujah! Glory, glory hallelujah! God's truth is marching on.
