I pray that your Advent is off to a peaceful and purposeful start as we, once again, eagerly await the coming Messiah. On December 14, we will have our annual **Advent hymn festival** during morning worship. This year we will feature more congregational

hymns than we do some years, in part, because there are so many wonderful new Advent hymns in our new hymnal. Rather than choose one hymn to feature, I've decided to give you a glimpse at each hymn and anthem, hopefully providing a "30,000-foot view" of the trajectory for the whole service. The title of the hymn festival this year is, "**The Coming Son of David**," so it isn't surprising that we'll be focusing on aspects of His royalty.

After the Call to Worship (Isaiah 11:1-5), we'll sing a hymn, "Now the Heavens Start to Whisper." I imagine that all of heaven was abuzz with excitement as God's plan for redemption entered this new phase of Incarnation. Referencing Isaiah, the hymn identifies Jesus as the "seed of promise, deeply planted, child to spring from Jesse's stem!" Likewise, our service will begin with the whispered buzz of expectation as we look forward to the coming descendent of Jesse (and David, his son). After hearing Micah's prophecy that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem, we'll sing the familiar carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," which in vs. 4 addresses Jesus as the "holy child of Bethlehem."


After hearing a reading of the Annunciation (Gabriel's appearance to Mary), we'll sing a paraphrase of Isaiah 9:2-7, "**The People Who Walked in Darkness**." I paired these for several reasons. First, Gabriel came to Mary in Nazareth, which is in the land that Isaiah specifically mentions as where people in darkness will see a great light ("the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali"). Second, Gabriel promises that God will give Mary's Son the throne of David and an everlasting kingdom—fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy that the government would be on his shoulders and he would call, "Prince of Peace" whose rule will never end.

Our first anthem of the day is based on the Lutheran chorale, "Gottes Sohn ist kommen," usually translated, "Once He Came in Blessing." Here we find the clearest presentation of the salvation the Jesus will bring and a promise that "those who then are loyal find a welcome royal." And who better to offer a royal welcome than a king? Like Mary in the Magnificat (her song of praise and the reading before this anthem), we praise and welcome Him. After a reading on Gabriel's appearance to Joseph, another anthem follows, simply titled, "An Advent Reflection." The text of this anthem mirrors Joseph's confusion and "fragile longing" as we pray for hope and healing and that Christ will "come, live in our praise." To be like Joseph, we pray, "teach us to follow and obey." After reading the Song of Zechariah (John the Baptist's father), we will sing new hymn to a familiar tune. "O Lord, How Shall I Meet You" is a fitting culmination for this series of personal encounters with Gabriel. Like Mary, Joseph, and Zechariah may we give thought to how best to greet Jesus' coming.

Next, we'll have a bit of flashback, all the way to Numbers when Balaam—commissioned by Balak to curse Israel—instead blesses with a short, but potent prophecy that a star would come from Jacob and a scepter from Israel. The new Advent hymn that follows, "While We Are Waiting, Come," is a simple, meditative prayer entrusting waiting hearts to our faithful God. Our final anthem will follow the reading of Isaiah 40:1-11. Frequently using the text of the familiar and similarly named hymn, the anthem, "Come, O Long-Expected Jesus" invites Him to "rule in all our hearts alone" as we respond to His royal coming. Our concluding hymn will be a paraphrase of Isaiah 40, "Comfort, Comfort, Now My People," which is both familiar and comforting as we wait for the coming Son of David in our own troubled times.

I hope to see you on December 14, when the choir will welcome several guest singers to help lead us in worship. Please join us as we worship through music.


